Dog Lake is shallow, with a max depth of 15 feet. This lake contains numerous low rocky islands. Kaweenakumik also contains many islands, which are small and rugged. Lake St. Martin also contains islands which are low-lying. Islands may be characterized by emergent and submergent wetland vegetation, rocky mudflats, barren and/or having substantial tree and shrub cover.
