Manitoba is home to some of the most outstanding sites in the world for concentrations of birds. The importance of these sites to the maintenance of the world's bird populations is recognized internationally through their designation as Important Bird Areas (IBAs).

During years of high-water levels, the north spit can be partially covered in water and thereby creating an island. The centre of the north spit is vegetated with grasses, shrubs, and willow stands, while the shoreline consists of mixed sand and gravel. The size of the south spit is dependant on water levels, ranging from 10 to 60 meters wide. Vegetation on this spit includes grasses, willows, and cattails.
